Introduction to the QVIZ project

QVIZ will research and create a framework for visualizing and querying archival resources by a time-space interface based on maps and emergent knowledge structures. The framework will also integrate social software, such as wikis, in order to utilize knowledge in existing and new communities of practice.

QVIZ will lead to improved information sharing and knowledge creation, easier access to information in a user-adapted context and innovative ways of exploring and visualizing materials over time, between countries and other administrative units. The common European framework for sharing and accessing archival information provided by the QVIZ project will open a considerably larger commercial market based on archival materials as well as a richer understanding of European history.

Progress

Kick-off

The kick-off meeting was carried out May 9-11. Issues such as practical implementations, potentially problematic areas and administrative routines were discussed. A first steering group meeting was also held in conjunction with the kick-off meeting.

State of the art analysis

Extensive work has been carried out to gather knowledge and resources for further analysis. In particular the following issues/technologies have been covered:

- Annotation of resources
- Access to digital resources
- Visualization of time and space
- Data preparation for time-spatial visualization
- Semantic descriptions of resources
- Social software (wikis, blogs, combinations)
- Cross institution authorization
- Gazetteer services and protocols
- Persistent digital identifiers

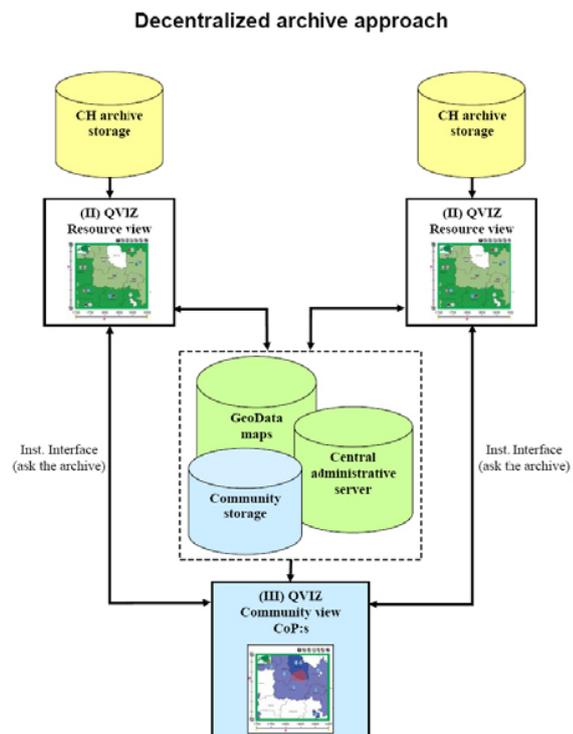
Requirements analysis

The requirement analysis carried out so far includes:

- Identification of existing and future user of archival resources
- Drafting user scenarios using online wiki
- Descriptions and analysis of business models of archives
- Deriving functional requirements

Concept mock-ups

Concept mock-ups and storyboards have been employed to stimulate and design user scenario descriptions. These have been very efficient in promoting the understanding of various ideas and scenarios. Mock-ups have addressed some of the issues of access strategies, and also some issues and problems with a completely centralized system. See right for a schematic representation of a decentralized approach.



Dissemination

The project will be disseminated through various meetings, conferences, information materials and this newsletter. A project leaflet, poster and a website, were created at an early stage.
